

Lay Reader's letter ~ Dorrit Smith

The word Pentecost just means 50 days. It comes from the Hebrew tradition and refers to the number of days elapsed from the offering of the Barley sheaf at the beginning of Passover. The 50th day was the feast of Pentecost. The time that elapsed was seven weeks and so it was also called the 'Feast of Weeks'. In later Hebrew times, it was regarded as the anniversary of the Law giving on Sinai, that is seven weeks after the Exodus.

It is no strange matter then, that the same pattern was kept for the timing of the coming of the Spirit. The *new* law - the *new* concept of God. The exodus and, later, the giving of the law, marked out Israel as God's peculiar people. So just what will Pentecost 2013 do for us? What mark will it lay upon us?

We might think that the Spirit will take us out of the worldly realm, or else fear the possibility that it will mark us out as a bunch of has-beens. But, the Gospel writers make it clear that the spirit is the agent of renewal, not retirement; the agent of wild stirrings and wonderment, of active participation and focussed prayer. It is the same spirit that brooded over creation; that spoke through the prophets; that will create all things new and bring about the reconciliation of young and old, slave and free, male and female, heaven and earth.

Too idealistic? Don't settle for anything less. We must, however expect that in embracing it, we may be called to join the world, not reject it; called to be challenged as the Jewish disciples were challenged; called to give up some things for the sake of the new and to allow the reinterpretation, the re-seeing, of some of our dearest held beliefs. If Jesus had not been subject to the will of His Father, and sacrificed himself, there would be no Pentecost, no coming of His spirit into the world. There would be no coming of that mystical super-strength that sometimes overwhelms us, and sometimes just

super-strength that sometimes overwhelms us, and sometimes just quietly sustains us in the face of trouble, criticism, bereavement and the like.

This power, this liberating burst of knowledge of the ever present Christ, is what makes us Christians able to keep going. God certainly knew what he was doing when he gave out his Spirit for free. It is there all the time waiting for us to receive and use for his purposes. It is not some airy fairy notion, something wrapped up in the mists of time, something that happened a long time ago. It is here, now, and it is for the taking.

It does however come with a health warning. If you take it, be prepared for its energising power to take hold of you, sweep through you and bring a new light to your life. The spirit of Jesus disturbs us into new thought and it makes those who are filled with it feel compelled to sing out of tune with the rest of the world. Be prepared to want to do things for Jesus sake; to begin to love your neighbour, serve your community, look out for the needy and even to feel like going along to your local church to be with others who have also found themselves so empowered.

The Ord Statter Pavilion: The future - A public consultation:

Part 1, should we consider renewal?

The Ord Statter
Pavilion is nearly
50 years old and
in need of repair
and attention.
The trustees
estimate that
the cost of
repairs,
replacements



and works necessary to meet current standards will exceed £50,000. Only £8,000 is currently available in Pavilion Funds. The trustees are considering a redevelopment of the building to provide a community facility fit for the 21st century.

Mylor Parish Council resolved that before any decision is made, the community must be consulted. Please let us know your views.

- 1. Do you agree that consideration should be given to redeveloping the Pavilion?
- 2. If you think it should not be developed but repaired, where would the money come from?
- 3. The Trustees believe that capital grants for redevelopment are available; in the event that plans are drawn up to redevelop the Pavilion, please indicate what facilities you would like the new building to provide. For example, a modern facility could include a sports hall, meeting room, kitchen, lounge/sitting area, changing rooms for playing field sports activities etc. It could also include facilities for Scouts and Guiding.
- 4. Any other comment?

Churchyard Restoration Group: There are visible signs of spring in our Churchyard. At last, I hear you sigh! The primulas, daffodils, violets, wild crocus and cyclamen are all breaking into flower and are a joy to behold.

We were delighted to see that the Bronze Age boat – built at the National Maritime Museum – has almost been completed. Some months ago we were approached by the NNMC and asked if we would be able to provide the team with some branches of Irish Yew. Various lengths of Yew were taken to the museum and "thin whips" were then made and used as laces to tie the planks of wood together. Great to know that a little bit of Mylor has gone into the building of this quite remarkable boat.

Following an approach by a Falmouth University student studying wildlife film and photography we have become very aware of the amount of wildlife living in and around the Churchyard. Her interest is welcome and she has asked to help with the maintenance work as well as carrying out her studies. With her guidance we have used twigs to build little areas in which all sorts of Critters can hide. Our large woodpiles provide habitat for hedgehogs and larger creatures.

Following the decline in the Hedgehog population we have joined the Hedgehog Street campaign and would be thrilled if we were to find some Hedgehogs in our Churchyard. We are also looking into ways that we might encourage bees into the environment. Both of the above are threatened and if we can do anything to encourage them to return we would feel a great sense of achievement. We have bags of logs for sale at £1.00 a bag. These are stacked adjacent to the bell-tower and are easy to carry. We have now planted our first 'Donated' shrub and look forward to further requests.

The team is always looking for extra pairs of hands - nothing too strenuous unless you want it to be! We meet on Wednesday mornings at 10.30am in the Churchyard - unless it is really very cold or wet.





Miss Julia Garnet, retired history teacher, atheist, devout communist and virgin, prompted by the death of her friend to leave the self imposed confines of her life and small flat in London to go and live in an "out-of-the-way" address in Venice - the Campo Angelo Raphael. As she steps from the water taxi and her gaze is drawn upward to "the benevolent gaze of an angel", an angel with his arm around a boy holding a fish, with a dog at his side, she begins a journey of self discovery.

The people she meets, the emotional relationships she makes and the strange beauty of Venice, with its spectacular architecture and abundance of art, history and ancient mysticism, storm Miss Garnet's staunch English reserve and challenge her socialist ideology, opinion, judgements and attitudes that leave no room for wonder or transcendence.

Her discovery of a series of paintings in the nearby Church of the Angel Raphael, inspires a fascination in the ancient tale of Tobias, who travels to Media, unaware that that he is accompanied by the Archangel Raphael and it is this tale which underpins this novel of stories within stories. As Julia unravels the story of Tobias's redemption, so the threads of interwoven stories are also unravelled. Our next meeting is on September 9 when there is an illustrated talk by *Tom Clarke*, head gardener at Trelissick. *Maggie Farley*







Local History ~ Trefusis - A New Resort?

This is an article published in The West Briton in 1859.

"We have had the opportunity of inspecting a plan of the contemplated new town of Trefusis, which is proposed to be built on the estate of Trefusis, opposite Falmouth, on the banks of Falmouth Harbour.

The main drive appears to be laid out in accordance with the contour of the hill and at the bottom of the wooded valley, just behind Kiln Quay. It is intended to erect a large crescent of fifteen houses of a superior class, with an ornamental garden common to the whole front; and behind, a public garden, with walks, fountains, trees and shrubs. The coastline is proposed to be

fringed with marine villas and terraces with gardens on the hill side; the higher ground to have castellated villas, crescents and terraces, with accommodation land behind."

The new resort was proposed by Lord Clinton, the then owner of Trefusis Estate. Four years later, although the project was not started, he was also

considering the building of a swing bridge across the Penryn River from Greenbank to Trefusis, to enable the development of the proposed town without impeding navigation. Neither of the two schemes was ever commenced.

As the start of the sailing season draws near we will be launching most of the 120 boats we have stored at Mylor Creek Boatyard over the coming weeks. If you have not yet booked your launch slot then to please contact Karen in good time before you wish to depart.

As well as launching our winter storage customer's boats, we will also be launching two boats we have carried out major refits on *Amokura*, a 1939 50ft Yawl designed by Fred Shepherd, and *Sceptre*, the British Challenger to the America's Cup in 1958.

Amokura has come to our yard from the Mediterranean after a recommendation from the captain of Argyll (a boat Cockwells have previously worked on). Some of the work being carried out includes refurbishing the deck and topsides,



inspecting the keel, servicing the engine and modifying the internal joinery. Once the work has been completed *Amokura* will be sailed back to the Mediterranean for a summer of sailing. She was famed in the novel *Oyster River* by George Millar.



We lifted *Sceptre* into our mobile dry dock and floated her up to our boatyard for a major structural refit last November. The work included removing the ballast keel from the boat, something that has not been done since she was first launched.

Wildwatch ~ Dorrit Smith

My Mum, who would have been 100 this year, used to say when I complained about the rain in April "March winds and April Showers, bring forth the May flowers." I'm sure you have all heard it but one must never take the old sayings for granted. For example last year we had a heat wave - the only one to occur all year! - and the spring flowers were superb.

The month of May is a wonderful time to see wildlife. Our summer migrants have all now arrived and their songs and calls mingle with the resident bird species. Summer specialities such warblers have arrived and fill the woodlands and hedgerow with their songs, and the sea cliffs clamour with breeding birds, each squabbling for their own little space. Look out for Guillemots, Shags, Cormorants and Puffins as well as Fulmar Petrels, and all the other Gulls. In the gardens and parks blue tits, great tits, robins, blackbirds and song thrushes lead a frantic life seeking food to satisfy the insatiable appetite of their young. After one or two broods the blue tits particularly look frazzled and in a good year all these species will have more than one brood. They all start much earlier than you imagine. Our Robins were building in late March! The hedge banks cascade red, white and blue in true patriotic fashion and the woodland flora is at its best in early May when the woodland floor is awash with bluebell flowers. In the damper woodlands these are often mixed in with, or replaced by, the white

flowers and pungent leaves of wild garlic. There are two main types of this which we should be able to distinguish. There is the Three Cornered Leek, *Allium triquitetrum*, which has a loose head of blunt, white flowers with each petal having a green line down the middle and a very noticeable



triangular stem, hence its name. Then there is Wood garlic or Ramsons, *Allium ursinum*, which has a tighter head of star-like white flowers without the green stripe and a much broader leaf. Both are associated with bluebells in England and are often a



pointer to the presence of an ancient woodland site. Both are edible. The leaves of Ramsons can be used in salad, boiled as a vegetable, in soup, or as an ingredient for pesto in lieu of basil. The bulbs and flowers of both are also very tasty. Why not give them a whirl? But don't eat the Bluebells - they are poisonous!

Farming Notes ~ Matthew Dale

I am officially in mourning, not to the point of wearing a black armband but mourning none-the-less. My loss isn't that of an iconic and, at times divisive, former Prime Minister, rather the demise of my old Land Rover. After owning it for sixteen of its nineteen years it met its end when another driver pulled out in front of

me. It looked as though the Land Rover had suffered little more than a scratch, the front end of the other car was ripped right off, but the chassis was twisted and deemed too expensive to repair. It may be rebuilt by an enthusiast and thus reincarnated as they are such revered machines, but not by us.

Now we have the task of finding a replacement, something that we hadn't anticipated doing for another decade or so. Decision time: do we go for another Land Rover – they hold their value, excellent off-road, almost indestructible, and could pull a beach hut from a bog. But they are uncomfortable, poor on the road and have the aerodynamics of said beach hut. Then there are the Japanese pick-up trucks. They are very good off-road, robust, reliable and, importantly comfortable on the road and to drive. Life is full of dilemmas.

A recent example is that of the oil seed rape (OSR). The slugs ate all but thirty acres of the one hundred and thirty-five we planted back in September. 



The winter of 1962/63 was a cold one. The freezing temperatures started just before Christmas and lasted until March. England shivered; in Mylor we went tobogganing. The village school was predictably shut but those of us that lived beyond Six Turnings made the most of being cut off. The steep fields behind Church Road were designed for slalom and anything that presented little resistance was commandeered for sledging; tin trays; corrugated roofing; and for the alpinists, custom made toboggans of tarry timber planed smooth in my father's workshop. The creek froze; not like the Thames, but enough to make an expedition to the other side a real proposition. Like Scott and Shackleton in woollen mittens and pom-pom hats, we set out in a small plywood dinghy -The Seagull - and rowed this way and that cracking the fragile ice floes. I was only nine years old; my cousin not much older but we were happy and brave as boys are that live and play on the water. Like much of Cornwall, Mylor was beginning to be touched by the sixties. Beatle-mania was about to strike and for those that had TV, the BBC news following the "Big Freeze" was about the Profumo affair. The news in Church Road however, was the imminent move to the old farm at Tregatreath. My father, Terry, had plans for a bigger boat yard than the small beach where we lived. He had built his first working boat, Result in the garage next to the house, launching her down the road on someone else's slipway. The opportunity for more space came from one of his first customers, local squire, Henry Trefusis. Through that winter Father had steadily been renovating the small cob cottage, pulling down walls that separated the dark rooms, replacing the box stairways with open steps and adding extra beams to the precarious ceilings. At six foot five; he could only ever stand between the beams and was forever cracking his head on the low doorways. The cluster of cow sheds with its orchard and marshes was a new world. The ground ran upwards to a bank in front of the cottage which protected the farm yard from spring tides, especially if driven by strong easterlies. Although the road ended on the beach, a well worn track ran on past the building, hugging the edge of the orchard wall to a spring called Crow Well. Salt marshes extended out from the well but its waters were always sweet and fresh. The orchard was our own kingdom, my brother and I, apples and sloes, hawthorn and dog rose gave fruit and the streams were full of elvers and tiny crabs. When the tide crept over the course grasses I learned to swim and sail in a place known simply as 'the creek'.

I've been making up stories for as long as I can remember. Getting measles and chickenpox meant being dowsed with calamine lotion and having lots of time to read. But what I really wanted was to write a book; a story of romance – because to love and be loved is one of nature's strongest forces – and adventure – because in desperate situations people find strengths and courage they didn't know they possessed. My first took three years to research and write. Entitled *Deadly Feast* and set in a Cornish village it was published by Robert Hale and kick-started my writing career. I've had 27 books published over 35 years, and have recently sent off number 28. Over the next ten months six of my historicals will be published in paperback by Accent Press, beginning with *Eye of the Wind* on 25 April. More About ~ Peter Watson

In our March issue you will have seen a centre spread of photos taken in the wonderful garden at *Creekside* owned by *Peter and Judy Watson*. Their house, situated on a hillside in Restronguet near the Pandora Inn, has a magnificent view across the Carrick Roads.



Part of the house is probably five hundred years old and has a garden first developed by Peter's mother in 1929. With its twisting paths on different levels and ingenious hidden flower beds, the garden is a true labour of love for the Watsons. It is unusual these days to remain in the same house, as Peter has done all his life, but the gradual improvements and care for the land have remained a constant pleasure and challenge for him.


In the early days, Peter ran the property as a market garden with his family, gradually buying and adding more land. They grew fruit, vegetables and flowers, much of which went by train to Covent **Garden market. The original apple trees planted by Peter's father** are still there, along with a wonderful collection of Camellias, trees and shrubs.

Letting holiday houses became an addition to the family business providing useful income but plenty of hard work for Peter and Judy. Now Peter's son Martin looks after about 40 properties which are always popular in this beautiful part of Cornwall.

Peter remembers a very different Mylor – a time when he knew most people and played an active part in village life. He was a Councillor for both Church and Parish, a member of the St Mylor Players and a committee member of the Restronguet Sailing Club in the days when it *was* at Restronguet. He spoke warmly of leading public figures such as Escott Williams, Rodney Prout and of course Tony Andrew.

Peter also recalled the early days of the Pandora Inn, when it had no proper bar and was just a room at the front with a kitchen at the back and living quarters upstairs. I asked him if they were affected by the huge fire at the Pandora in 2011, but fortunately the wind was blowing from the South East, otherwise it might have been another story!


