Vicar's letter ~ Revd Jeffrey James

For many people September feels like January, not in terms of weather but because it marks the beginning of the new academic year. In the same way that the new calendar year holds out the promise of new possibilities, the new school year is full of opportunity. There are new people to meet, new places to explore and knowledge and skills to acquire. So for many



children and young people, it's not surprising that this is a time of considerable excitement.

I sense that most people hope that it is also a time of excitement and opportunity for the teachers and teaching assistants and other staff who help to make nurseries, schools and colleges safe and welcoming places where children and young people can make the most of their gifts and talents. Our friends and neighbours who work in learning establishments need to feel that we value their role in developing the citizens of tomorrow. Our village school and its staff are held in high esteem by the community served by the school. But that is not a matter of luck or good fortune. It comes about because of partnerships between children and teachers, parents and staff where the goals of individual learning and development sit alongside a shared sense that the school serves the wider community. These partnerships take time to develop and require effort to sustain. The fruit of these efforts is seen as succeeding generations of children are encouraged to take their place in the wider world and school staff can fulfil their calling to be educators in the broad sense of that term.

The idea of a calling to serve others is well known and recognised and not just in faith communities. It is wonderful that some of our ablest men and women still sense that call to serve the community as teachers. This September, I'd like to suggest that as well as giving thanks for those who serve us in nurseries schools and colleges, we ask ourselves what we might do to strengthen and support that work. For some this will mean serving as volunteers to support school activities, for others it might mean supporting the school governing body. For all of us it could mean being mindful of the village school as a vital part of our community and offering encouragement in whatever way

we can.

Community News and Views

Parish Council: The monthly meeting was held on 5 August in Mylor Parish Hall. A new web site is planned in an attempt to improve communications with parishioners and provide up to date information. There was discussion on the merits of a professionally made site or a basic, low cost site. It was decided to proceed with the latter, learn from it and review the situation in a years time.

Grant money is now available from the Parish Council toward projects based in the parish and run for the benefit of the community as a whole. Application details will be posted on the village notice board or from the Parish Clerk.

It is pleasing to report that all footpaths have now been walked and a condition report is being prepared. This will be submitted to Cornwall Council who are responsible for their maintenance. Side growth is the responsibility of the land owner. Mylor paths are now passable following side growth cutting by land owners and others, but some paths in Flushing remain a problem. This has been reported to Cornwall Council. The Parish Council carried out its annual inspection of property belonging to it or in its care. This includes the Leats car park, playing fields, cemetery, war memorial and Flushing Bowling Green. It is hoped to set up a small work party to attend to such things as weeds/rubbish around the telephone box, small paint jobs and dirty road signs. The group will be informal, fun and timed to suit you so please contact me on 01326 375252 if interested.

A public meeting is to be held on the sighting of a car park in Flushing, dates to be arranged. We would like to hear your point of view. On 18 Aug a re-dedication service for Flushing War Memorial, will be held on Flushing Quay at 7.15pm. Everyone is welcome.

To date, no planning application has been submitted for development of the land north of Cogos Park. Once an application has been registered you have 21 days to send your comments to Cornwall Council either electronically or in writing. (www.cornwall.gov.uk/planning) *Jan Robson*

There is a camera obscura and Skyspace, an elliptical domed chamber from which to view the sky. This was a wonderfully cool place to rest after negotiating the steep



slopes. Once at the top of the garden you are rewarded with a view across to St Michael's Mount. In this frost free valley there are streams, woods and exotic and sub-tropical plants. Rather like The Eden Project but with no domes. An interesting visit end to our visits this year. Our evening meetings resume on 9 September at 7.30 in the Ord Statter Pavilion with an illustrated talk by Tom Clarke, head gardener at Trelissick. Members and visitors are all welcome.

Victoria O'Regan, the Brownie leader, brought her group of youngsters down to the churchyard at St Mylor for an activity which would help them complete a badge award activity. We had devised a two hour slot of observing, finding and naming some of the many animals and plants that inhabit our churchyard. The group learned how to collect specimens safely with pooters and to observe without harming anything. They saw how the churchyard volunteers have left some places for wild-life to flourish in the environment as well as setting up other places for animals to hide. They were



able to observe many bugs and creepy crawlies, a slow-worm or two and the swallow patiently sitting on her nest brooding her young. They saw the bat droppings in the church porch as evidence of our resident Pipistrelles and proof of vole activity in the form of runs under a piece of corrugated iron. The evening finished with an individual challenge quiz which was well answered by everyone. Each Brownie was awarded a certificate of completion at the end of the evening and all of us, adults and children, said how much they had enjoyed themselves. All good news for youngsters growing up in a rural environment.

The Darlwin Disaster: I am currently researching for a book on the tragic loss of the Darlwin on 31 July 1966. The Pleasure boat, on a day trip from Mylor to Fowey, disappeared in poor weather on its return somewhere off The Dodman. The wreck was never located and all 31 on board were lost. Most of the passengers came from The Greatwood Hotel. A brother and sister from Mylor were tragically lost and there is a memorial screen to all the victims in St Mylor Church. Churchyard Restoration Group: Over past months we have left large areas of the Churchyard to nature and some of the weeds and wild flowers are now taller than many of the headstones. This is done each year to meet the requirements of Cornwall's Living Churchyards remit. We are now cutting back these areas and for a while our lovely churchyard will look fairly untidy. The cut grasses will be raked into piles and removed for composting. We have weeded some more graves and re-chipped them. We desperately need some additional help to maintain these and the other graves we've cleared, so if you have an hour to spare once a month we could allocate some graves to your care. All the hard work will have been done and all that is necessary is to keep the gravel weeded and perhaps add a small bunch of flowers if an anniversary should occur on one of your allocated graves. Please call me if you'd like further information.

During the past few months we have seen mice, slow worms, butterflies, voles, grey squirrels and many birds. We also have badgers and foxes visiting regularly. Sadly we haven't seen any hedgehogs. We are still keen to have a couple of bird boxes fixed to one of our trees. Has anyone got one hidden in a shed that they could donated? We can arrange to come and collect it. Our logs from last year's fallen branches have been drying out and we will be offering bags of logs for sale towards the end of September.

The local members of The Ganges Association visited the memorial to attend to its maintenance. They were joined by a team of volunteers from RNAS Culdrose. The chain and anchors around the memorial have been re-painted and the paths and gravel weeded. It was great to see such an eager team of volunteers working alongside the Association. The following note was received from the team:

All the willing 'volunteers' were from the Engineering Training Section, (ETS) at RNAS Culdrose. They included four Aircraft Engineering Technician trainees who are at Culdrose to complete their Phase 2b training which lasts for 23 weeks. This period consists of a mix of classroom theory and work place training culminating in an examination that, if passed, allows them to conduct aircraft maintenance. The rest of the group were made up of Instructors from ETS. Everyone who attended enjoyed it greatly and it was very worthwhile assisting in the upkeep of an important Naval memorial and we look forward to providing further assistance.







Local History ~ Trelissick sale

An historic country house was the scene recently of a grand two day auction sale of its contents and the renowned Copeland China Collection. These days such a sale is a rare event and people came from far and wide to attend. Trelissick, originally a modest mid-eighteenth century



house, was acquired in 1800 by the *Daniell* family and later remodelled in neo -classical style. Standing on the terrace, one has a magnificent view, with parkland sloping down to the water and then across Carrick Roads to Pendennis Castle and Falmouth Bay beyond.

For three days potential bidders were able to wander through beautifully appointed rooms filled with artefacts collected from around the world over the past 200 years. Everything on view was for sale and many people were there to admire the china collection started by the then occupants *Ronald and Ida Copeland* and which eventually comprised 2500 pieces from the last three

centuries. It was one of the largest and most important collections of Spode and Copeland china in private hands. After the viewing came the sale itself. It was great entertainment. The stable yard became a grand auction venue. A raised floor with seating was surmounted by a marquee roof lined with simulated ruched silk and there were large floral arrangements. Well before the start, there was standing room only.

The auctioneer, on a high rostrum, was flanked by several assistants armed with telephones and computer screens. Several auctioneers took their turns as each item was displayed on a large screen. They included *John Sandon* of the BBC's Antiques Roadshow.


Bidding was brisk, but complicated by bids left with the auction house, bids from the room, numerous telephone bids and also internet buyers from around the world, including China and Hong Kong.

Wildwatch: Snakes and Lizards part 2 ~ Dorrit Smith

Last month I gave you some facts about reptiles and about our three species of British snakes. This month it is time to read of the three types of British lizard. If you are quiet and observant you are bound to see at least one of them. There are plenty of Common Lizards around on the rocky, grassy upper parts of our shores at the moment.


Sand lizard

The very rare Sand Lizard prefers to lay eggs into shallow hollows dug in sandy soil. Like the smooth snake in last month's article, it is found mainly in southern Britain. These lizards, which can grow to 20cm, have a grey-beige background with dark



brown blotches. Males take on a bright green side colour in the breeding season. Sand lizards have the ability to take food in large quantities when it is freely available and will eat most types of insects, worms and slugs. They will eat their own young too, if necessary.

Common lizard



The Common Lizard is also known as the Viviparous Lizard because, like the Adder, it gives birth to live young. These lizards can live almost

anywhere, but they prefer reasonably warm places with good basking sites. They are frequently found even in graveyards. Adults can reach 14cm and colouration can include shades of brown, grey and dark green. They are insect eaters and also eat small snails. The first you may see of them is a sudden movement out of the corner of your eye. Be patient and keep looking; even if it has hidden itself it will eventually poke its head out to see if you are still there!

Slow-worm

Slow-worms are really lizards, but have evolved into a legless form to suit their burrowing lifestyle. Slow-worms prefer well vegetated places which give good cover from predators. They have an almost cylindrical body which is hard and smooth to the touch, with a polished-looking grey or brown colouration. They are



beautiful. The young are shades of coppery gold with vivid dark brown sides. They feed mainly upon slugs, but also eat worms, spiders and snails. They are often found in compost heaps and so they are useful in your garden. They are often mistaken for snakes, but one look at their

head shape and gentle faces will tell you that they are not - there is also a 'hole' behind the eye on both sides of the head, this is their ear-hole and it is present in all lizards but not obvious in snakes.

Losing their tails

All lizards have the ability to 'self amputate' their tails for protection, leaving the tail with the predator while they escape. The process is known as autonomy. Here's what happens. The tail bones have a special weak spot where a contraction of the muscles at that point causes the bone to break and the tail to become loose. The separated tail continues to wriggle for several minutes which holds the attention of the predator while the tail-less lizard makes its escape. The lizard will grow a new tail, (this can take many months) but this is usually more stumpy than the original and less flexible. Slow-worms are also capable of autonomy, but are rarely able to grow a new tail afterwards. So, please do not grab them or pick them up because they *will* do it and all you will be left with is a bloody stump end and a mutilated reptile with less chance of escaping a real predator.

Farming Notes ~ Matthew Dale

Harvest has started and we have had some sunshine, an unusual combination of circumstances if last year is anything to go by. We thought that our surviving oil seed rape would be the first crop to go to the knife but the Maris Otter winter barley was ready first. It wasn't a brilliant crop due to the poor growing season but it did OK and it is now sitting in a collective grain store waiting to be malted and then brewed for Tribute ale.

The grain came off the field in lovely condition but the straw was too sappy to bale and it spent a fortnight on the ground being soaked by successive rainstorms. It took some spreading and turning to dry it out but it got there in the end and will now be used for winter bedding for cattle. There is nothing more satisfying than the baler following the combine around the field picking up the straw and for it then to be loaded and taken away. The field is then left clear and empty ready for the next crop.

One bit of good news is that the new Claas combine has lived up to and beyond expectations, which is just as well given what it cost. There was nothing really wrong with the John Deere we had before, in the sense that it was reliable and it did what we asked. The Claas too is reliable and



does what we ask but it does it faster and more efficiently. Add the factors that it is better built, better designed and holds its value better, then we feel that we really have made the right choice. Another right choice, albeit on a much smaller scale, was the one to spend almost £3000 on wide flotation tyres for the grain trailers. The ruts that were left in the ground last year by the standard tyres were horrendous. Even when full the trailers hardly left a mark on the fields. Our soil is our biggest and most important asset so it is worth the effort to look after it.

Point of View ~ Peace in Palestine and Israel

Following our comments in last month's magazine concerning our pilgrimage to Israel 'the troubled land', it is now of topical interest that peace talks have resumed. What we learned in Israel only covered part of the complex history which would take a whole issue of this magazine to explain. Simply, concerned for its security in 1967, Israel invaded a large territory known as the West Bank of the River Jordan and occupied by Palestinians. It was from this area that Palestinian extremists were launching terrorist and suicide bomb attacks against Israel. Since then this problem has subsided, mainly due to the completion of a massive wall that has been erected. From 1967, Palestinians living on the occupied West Bank were not allowed Israeli passports and in lieu were granted five year renewable permits to stay

Israeli passports and in lieu were granted five year renewable permits to stay and to work in Israel. They are no longer part of Palestine as such and Israel has built a number of Jewish settlements in the West Bank, mainly occupied by radicals who now total over 10% of Israel's population.

Part of the peace process involved assisting the West Bank economy. One such example was challenging the unnecessary Israeli restrictions on goods and produce crossing the border through the wall checkpoints. We saw that life for the West Bank Palestinians was not easy and there was much evidence of poverty. An example of harassment by the Israelis involved us on the coach returning to Tel Aviv airport. Our Palestinian driver produced all the correct papers but was nevertheless pulled over at the checkpoint. We had to wait about ten minutes whilst an Israeli guard strolled over to recheck our driver's paperwork, all of which was totally unnecessary. We also heard of ambulances coming from the West Bank to Israeli hospitals being delayed at the whim of the checkpoint guards where patients have died as a result. The humanitarian issues are ignored.

Added to the tensions caused by the Israeli occupation, the democratically elected Hamas Palestinian movement which controls the Gaza strip does not recognise the right of the Jewish state to even exist! One can see how serious are the conflicts of interest.

In October 2001 The 'Quartet' was formed. This consists of representatives from the EU, Russia, UN and USA. It was formed to negotiate a cease fire and peace process. Tony Blair is its special envoy and since 2001 he has made visits. The outcome so far, has not been successful. Whilst our Quartet speaker explained the intractability of both sides' demands and the seeming impossibility of a resolution, he felt some progress might be made if America, together with the UN brought pressure to bear, particularly on Israel. Undoubtedly, America's support of Israel has prevented serious open conflict and has been responsible for the precarious truce over nearly five decades. The current initiative by the Americans has opened the door once again, and one can only hope that the present talks make better progress.





More About ~ Lawrie Piper

Lawrie was born in 1931 at St Mary's Hospital, Paddington. When he was a month old, the family moved to Gloucestershire and he went to Marling School in Stroud. In 1949 he was stationed in Dover for National Service, where he met *Kath*, a young lady very much to his taste.

Returning to Stroud on demob, he joined his father at *Winterbotham, Strachan and Playne* who manufactured high quality woollen and worsted fabrics such as



billiard cloth, military uniform cloth, guards scarlets and hunting pinks. He gained a thorough grounding in cloth manufacture and also studied at Stroud Technical College to gain qualifications in technical management. At this time, *Lawrie* and *Kath* were married and had two sons, *Jeremy* and *Adrian*.

In 1961 Lawrie was appointed Head of the Textiles Department at Derby College of Higher Education and the family moved to Derby. In addition to full time work, further study and research led to a Masters degree in Education from Leicester University. He was appointed Vice-Principal of Cornwall Technical College in 1967. He also became an active member of the Health Authority, serving on several committees and chairing the Nurse Training Committee. After twelve years as Vice-Principal he became Principal of what is now Cornwall College, retiring in 1991. In collaboration with the staff of Camborne School of Mines, *Lawrie recently finished writing 'The History of Mining Education in Cornwall' which is awaiting publication.*

You may well be wondering what Lawrie did in his spare time! In earlier years he enjoyed dinghy sailing on the river Derwent in Derby, a family pastime which led in later years to owning a sailing cruiser and membership of the Royal Cornwall Yacht Club. His other interests include microscopy and walking, though nowadays, Mother Nature has decreed that he takes things more slowly.


