Vicar's letter ~ Revd Jeffrey James

Christmas is coming, and the pace of Christmas activity is hotting-up. For some months now, the James family letter box and inboxes have received a steady stream of invitations and encouragement. We've been invited to buy all manner of things from Christmas cards to tools for people in developing countries. So far it has been mainly religious and charitable organisations. In



the last two weeks, this has begun to change. The sign that shows me that we have changed gear is the thickness of magazines and newspaper colour supplements. Suddenly, there are more adverts setting out the wares of makers of food and drink, of clothes and presents just right for that special person in your life. Their message is really hard to miss; Christmas means spending money on ourselves and those we love.

Even people who don't know much about the Christian story can sense that, whatever it might be, Christmas is not at its heart a festival of conspicuous consumption. That's not to say that Christmas is a time for joyless solemnity. It certainly is a time for joy but the celebration is for all regardless of how rich or poor they might be. The clues to this come from the facts of the story itself. At Christmas we celebrate the birth of a child who had no proper home of his own. This child was visited as many new babies are, but not by adoring grandparents or aunts and uncles. He was visited by a rather rough and undesirable bunch of shepherds, people who in the society of that time lived on the margins of life. This simple unfussy unglamorous birth tells us about the nature of the God who steps into human history, shares our everyday existence as Jesus did. He comes humbly so that no-one might feel that they aren't able to greet him.

This is what's at the heart of Christmas and as we gather with friends and family to celebrate, it can be at the heart of our Christmas too. Christmas isn't about presents; it's about presence, the presence of the baby in the stable, of God among us sharing our humanity.

It's also about our presence too, our being ready to greet

the Christ child when he comes.

On behalf of the people who worship at St Mylor and at All Saints, I wish everyone a happy, joyous and peaceful Christmas.

Community News and Views

Parish Council: The monthly meeting was on Monday 4 November at Flushing Village Club. Concern was expressed by members of the public about the withdrawal of the 400 bus to Truro. The Parish Council will be writing to Cornwall Council to register their concern over this, and ask for a meeting with an officer dealing with buses. We are all concerned.

Two very successful Public Meetings have been held regarding the Parish Plan update. 121 members of the public attended at Mylor and 66 at Flushing, with 18 names put forward to join the Parish Plan Team. A committee is being formed to move the Plan on. Thank you all for turning up and putting your comments down regarding the future of our parish.



There was a good community atmosphere at both meetings.

The car park meeting at Flushing was also well attended. Land below Poplar Terrace, St Johns Hill, was voted the most popular site for a possible car park where around ten parking spaces could be facilitated, costing £21,000 at the last count. There is a possibility of 38 more spaces on the opposite side of the road but this could cost another £121,000. The Parish Council has very limited funds and this is always going to be a problem.

The Public Meeting about the application to develop land north of Cogos Park, was also well attended. No members of the public spoke in favour of it, and the application was unanimously opposed by the Parish Council. The application for 5 dwellings off Comfort Road was supported by a majority vote by the Council.

The precept or budget for 2014/15 was approved by the Council and will be submitted to Cornwall Council. The *Parish Work Party* has tidied/weeded around the entrance to the Leats Car Park and on Mill Quay. Depending on the weather we hope to paint the bollards on the edge of the Pub Car Park, so beware wet paint! Details can be found on www.parish-council.com/mylor.

Feature ~ A process of metamorphosis.

Fifty years ago the old farm at Tregatreath began a steady change. My father, *Terry Heard*, began the process to turn the lowly stone sheds and byres into a busy boat yard that would become known in distant corners of the sailing world. That meant the guiet backwater of Mylor creek would have to change. Where a small dairy herd had meandered for generations, the changing attitudes and new found affluence of the sixties meant that there would be boats of all sizes and shapes to lay up. Before long the retaining dyke had been levelled to allow deep keeled yachts and working boats to be hauled almost to the front door of the cottage on the beach. Sometimes the spring tides drove Mylor Creek to within a few yards of the front door. When these high tides were imminent, family and friends would drag and drape long chains over any loose timber giving the impression of a heavy metal crochet, ensuring that no flotsam with our name on it would be able to vacate. These same high tides brought an exciting selection of pelagic sailors to our table. The yard was soon regarded as a safe haven, somewhere one could get repairs to a weather beaten yacht and a steaming cup of tea at the kitchen table. We were fascinated by these birds of passage; foreign sailors, French, German and American and often retired English gents in search of tropical seas and treasure islands. From these we learned scraps of navigation, heard our first foreign voices, read our first real life adventures; of Heyerdahl, Slocum, and Sherwood. The yard also attracted people who wanted good boats built. Terry had established a reputation for seaworthy craft and with yacht designer, *Percy Dalton*, had created a good looking and capable working boat, *St Melorus*. She eventually sailed to the Caribbean and now resides in New England. Two *Paul Johnson* designed Venus ketches were also built in the yard for blue water sailors; but it's for the Falmouth working boats the yard was best known. Over the years the yard produced many of the spectacular cutters we see racing in Falmouth harbour throughout the summer months.

Tides and times have changed but the fifty year legacy of Terry and Martin Heard remain. The boats they started to build half a century ago endure, and many can be spotted in harbours around the world; a lasting testimony of the little farm yard at Tregatreath.



Local History Group ~ Lecture

The history of telegraph in Cornwall by Professor Garry Perry. It was in 1849 that the first successful trial of a submarine cable linking London with a ship in the English Channel was held. The secret of that success was the insulation of a latex called 'gutta percha' from trees in the Malay peninsula, but it was not strong enough for long distances. In 1851 they tried again with cable reinforced with galvanised iron and tarred hemp. After several attempts and broken cables, a link was finally made from Porthcurno in Cornwall to North America in 1866, with the help of Brunel's Great Eastern. In 1872, a historic cable was completed that circumnavigated the world and continents could communicate in hours rather than weeks using the newly invented telegraph system. They were still in use until WW2 when less vulnerable tunnels were dug into solid granite, At its height, Porthcurno was a hub of communication with 14 cables coming ashore. Fibre optics and satellites are used as they can carry much greater traffic. We also heard about the Porthcurno museum, which we thought might be a good place for a group visit. Our next lecture is on 25 January and is 'Fishing in the days of sail and oar' by Professor Jan Pentreath. Rosemary Spooner

Local History ~ Harry Moore's Christmas memories

Looking back through old copies of 'St Mylor Church and Village News', I came across an article in the 1973 edition written by *Joan West*. She records some of the reminiscences of *Harry Moore*, who was born in 1881. Here he talks about his time as a boy when he was a member of the Carol Choir. What a busy Christmas he had!

There were between 40 and 50 in the Carol Choir. One of my uncles was the choirmaster and two of them were also instrumentalists in it. One played a flute, the other a cornet. The one who was the choirmaster sometimes played the flute and also the euphonium. I was the youngest member and played a flute.

We practised in Penhall's barn at Cogus at the end of Comfort Road. A famous character in the choir was *Mr Albert Row* (Bill's father). He had a fine bass voice and I can still hear him pouring out 'The gates of brass before Him bow, the iron fetters yield.'

On Christmas Eve, the choir journeyed to Falmouth, opened the programme at Market Strand and then toured the town singing outside the hotels. They reached Mylor about 11-12 pm.

At 7 am on Christmas morning the choir sang in the village, then went to Mylor Churchtown, singing en route, then around Trefusis to Flushing and back to Mylor to eat Christmas dinner at home.

After dinner we went to Restronguet and Weir and back to the farms on the road to Carclew, e.g. Halwin, Crownick, Restronguet and, of course, a call at the Pandora for refreshment. Then to Carclew, where after singing in front of the house the choir was entertained to supper in the servants' hall - beer, beef, pudding, cake, mince pies, etc.

From there we went to Broads Lane and on to Enys, with more refreshments on the road, especially at Canara Farm (occupied in those days by *Mr Lindsay Lawrence*). I remember on one occasion Lindsay enquiring: "What about it, boys, are you feeling dry?" The reply of one member: "Yes, and hurry up or we shall catch fire," brought the beer and cake. We small boys were regaled with either ginger wine or peppermint water, both home made, and a slice of Christmas cake.

At Enys the same ritual prevailed, and then we returned to Mylor just in time for another lot of refreshments before 10 o'clock.

My uncle and I always went to *Miss Elizabeth Johns's* house, and had supper with *Harry Connor* and then, like Pepys, 'to bed!'

Wildwatch: ~ Dorrit Smith

I thought this was the month to write something about our most well known and best loved bird, the Robin. The Robins who live here do not migrate, but they are joined by birds from Scandinavia in the winter. These birds are



paler than ours and have a duller red breast. The immigrants are also generally less tame and skulk about in woodlands. Only our British Robins are a tame garden bird. Indeed we saw some Robins in Spain recently and were surprised by their shy behaviour.

The sexes are similar and even in the breeding season are distinguished only by their behaviour. Robins are very territorial and will defend their patch to the death. I have seen them fighting their reflection in the hub cap of a car wheel! Males and females hold separate feeding territories in winter but, by around Christmas, many will have paired up. They then defend a territory big enough to feed a family or two. Initially they do not spend much time together, merely tolerating one another, but they will remain close until the following autumn moult when they again begin to defend a winter feeding territory alone. They seldom survive more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ years.

Robins of both sexes sing their creamy song all year, mainly to advertise that a territory is taken. Singing only stops for a short time in late summer during the moult. They are adapted to life in poor light and are often active in half-light when few other birds are about. They are among the earliest birds to start the dawn chorus and one of the last to stop in the evening. Street lights are bad news for the Robin because they can trigger singing in the middle of the night, and if roosting Robins are disturbed, they will burst into song even in complete darkness. This tires them, using up valuable night energy stores. They are one of the only UK birds to be heard singing in the garden on Christmas Day - which brings me to the folklore. They are often known as 'holy birds' because of legends attempting to explain their red breasts. The two most common stories concern the birth and death of Christ. A Robin is supposed to have flown down to remove a thorn from the crown on Jesus' head, relieving some of his suffering. In so doing the blood stained his chest which has remained red ever since. Another story tells of a Robin flying into the place where Jesus was born and finding that the fire had nearly gone out, so it fanned the embers with its wings. The resulting flame singed his breast. The Virgin blessed him for his courage and when his breast healed he kept his red feathers. Lovely stories for this season of the year and I wish you the very best.



More about ~ Kay Deeming

When, last September, Kay received a letter inviting her to attend the Annual Gorsedh to be held this year at the historic centre of Glasney College Field at Penryn, she was quite taken aback.

She was to receive the Samson Hosking Memorial Cup 'Singer of Cornwall' for 2013 in recognition of her services to singing in Cornwall.

"Why me?" she thought - 'why indeed?'. Kay was a Hayle girl whose father was the village

'Duchy Opera' was the next step - with Kay taking the part of 'First Genie' in the company's third production of 'The Magic Flute'. Kay remembers feeling very much a small fish in a big pond.

Some time later the Cornish Baritone, *Ben Luxon*, attracted by seeing Duchy's first production of 'Carmen', joined the Company to sing the eponymous lead in Tchaikovsky's 'Eugen Onegin'. Kay has happy memories of singing the female lead 'Tatyana' along with such a strong and generous personality.

Operas, themed concerts and country house recitals followed, whilst the germ of the idea of taking workshops to schools grew.

Kay and a small group of singers were to visit schools, outlining the idea of stories sung rather than spoken and to involve the children in singing along with them.

Received enthusiastically by the schools, one outcome was a new children's' opera called 'The Little Mermaid' composed by *Paul Drayton*, the Director of Music. This has been performed around the County whilst still the workshops develop.
